3. COURSE CONTENT.

In this class for non-native English speakers, we will cover tools, resources, and approaches that can assist in writing your PhD thesis in English within the Humanities. This course is structured into three modules, each connected to the essence of the narrative writing process.

The first module will focus on planning and organizing the proposed content, with the goal of developing a table of contents as an overarching guide for your research. The second module will cover the actual process of writing various parts of the thesis, using different working tools and analyzing the various discursive modalities that can be employed in academic writing. Finally, students will become familiar with the process of correcting and editing academic texts. We will consider specific tools for reviewing the final version of the thesis, including internal (content and organization) and external (format) reviewing strategies.
